4. Will you commit to walk picket lines and speak at rallies in support of Somerville municipal workers who are bargaining for a fair and equitable contract? **YES**
5. Will you advocate to prioritize unionized municipal workers for public works projects over non-unionized private contracting? **YES**
6. Will you vote to reduce the police budget to increase funding to the Somerville Public Schools (SPS), Office of Housing Stability, and an unarmed, community-based emergency response program, separate from the Somerville Police Department (SPD)? **YES, though I'm more focused on increasing the budget for schools, housing, and community responders than I am about reducing the police budget.**
