Finding site for new westside fire station/approve bonding; discuss/approve zoning for MBTA communities; continue steady, predictable tax rates for residents thru continued growth in city

Lack of local newspapers had hurt communities across the country, but issues of importance to some can grow using social media-we saw it in Marlborough over a proposed housing development that went from a small group of opposed residents to hundreds of people. Also saw it when a site wanted to expand a pre-existing non-conforming site and reached out to its customers who showed up at a public hearing. People will participate if it's an issue they care about and there may be a story via social media. Sadly in Marlborough very few people vote in local elections, yet we have great turnout for national elections. I have heard it said, try calling the White House to complain about your trash pick-up or street issue-they can't/won't do anything yet people don't realize it's important to participate in the election at local level and it's important to learn about the candidates. I wish I had the magic answer for greater participation in local elections, but I don't. I belong to a service organization who has gone into high school to register students when they turn 18, that is a big first step and I do see the younger voters taking a greater interest in elections.
