We have many great community partners working on this issue the best way they can, but they currently need more money and more people to work the job. Partnering with our state delegation to secure more funding to our strained system will only temporarily fix the problem. Providing further support to our community partners needs to be done in tandem with efforts to increase housing stock to prevent more people from becoming unhoused in the first place.
