2. What prepares you to serve in this capacity?


I have experience working with some of Massachusetts' most respected and proactive leaders, and through that experience I have learned about the issues that affect the people of the 9th Essex every day. As a District Representative for Congressman Seth Moulton, I worked with constituents on a daily basis helping them navigate the federal bureaucracy. I've also been a longtime volunteer with GIRLS INC, a nonprofit working to inspire young female leaders.



II. The Issues

A. Revenue and Taxation

Despite the label of "Taxachusetts," Massachusetts actually ranks 22nd among states in terms of state and local taxes as a share of total personal income and below the national average. Between 1977 and 2012, Massachusetts reduced state taxes by more than all but one other state. Because of income tax cuts enacted between 1998 and 2002, Massachusetts is taking in over \$3 billion less in tax revenue each year. Such cuts to the state income tax have meant increasing reliance on fees, as well as sales, gas, and property taxes, exacerbating the overall regressivity of our revenue. Regressive taxation strains low- and middle-income families, and reduced revenue.




This 13.1% decline in tax revenue has led to deep budget cuts and ongoing budget challenges.

I am a strong supporter of the Millionaire's Tax, which would raise revenue by adding a 4% tax on incomes over 1 million dollars. 
I will oppose efforts to extend the sales tax holiday.



B. Job Growth and the Economy

The Massachusetts economy has continued to grow and recover from the Great Recession, but the gains have not been shared equally. Poverty levels continue to increase, while the minimum wage loses value every year. Massachusetts now ranks as one of the top ten most unequal states according to various measures of income inequality.

1. Share your personal values and principles on job growth and the economy.

How can we improve the economy and economic security for all people? How do we grow the



number of good paying jobs in the Commonwealth? How do you view wealth and income inequality, and what would you do about it, if anything?

The first step towards a healthy economy is making sure that everyone has access to the education they need in order to get a good job, and then making it so that every hardworking person gets a wage that they can live on. As a State Representative I will work with businesses to ensure that we create an environment that allows them to thrive, but I will also work hard for a living wage and equal pay, and will fiercely defend anti-discrimination laws on the books

Minimum Wage

3. Do you support or oppose raising the minimum wage to \$15 an hour? I support raising the minimum wage to \$15 an hour.

Indexed Minimum Wage

Equal Pay


9. Do you support or oppose legislation to further the principle of equal pay for equal work? I strongly support legislation guaranteeing equal pay for equal work.

C. Education and Workforce Development

Public education has always been a gateway to opportunity and mobility for all, regardless of economic circumstances, a cornerstone of the American dream for all residents. The mission of public schools is to serve all students, including English Language Learners and those with special needs. However, powerful corporate interests are working to undermine public schools, teachers, and unions. These groups are investing millions of dollars to promote the expansion of privately


run charter schools, which siphon money from our public K-12 districts while largely excluding students with the greatest needs. Various forms of privatization are being proposed and implemented, including charter schools and "turnaround" schemes that put private management groups in charge of struggling public schools. Costly, mandated standardized test results are used to justify these privatization schemes. Finally, the soaring price of higher education over the last several decades has made access to this opportunity increasingly out of reach, at the very moment when higher education makes a greater difference to one's economic future.

Section C, Figure 5 - Higher educational attainment leads to higher wages




Section C, Figure 7 - Massachusetts has been disinvesting from higher education and shifting the cost burden onto students.

Achievement gaps

3. What would you do to address persistent racial and economic achievement gaps in education?



I am a strong supporter of career centers, more affordable or free higher education and furthering adult education. I believe everyone should have the tools available to them to learn. It is so unfortunate in our society that frequently minorities are the ones who suffer economically simply because they couldn't afford to go to college or further their careers. It is a tragedy when learning is postponed or not possible due to finances. I am going to do everything I can to close that gap and make sure everyone has access to higher education.

Universal Pre-K

4. Do you support or oppose creating universal, free Pre-K, accessible to any resident of Massachusetts, integrated into the public school system?

The time period that Pre-K spans over in a child's life is a crucial developmental period. All children should have access to early education so that each child has an equal shot at excelling in the classroom. Preschool and kindergarten should no longer be a luxury, rather, early education should be seen as a necessity.

Standardized Testing

5. Do you support or oppose the use of high-stakes testing for such things as student promotion, high school graduation, teacher evaluation, and the evaluation of schools and districts?

There should be a regulated higher standard for the achievement levels of students, teachers, schools, and districts. However, this is not to say that MCAS promotes the correct standard. MCAS pressures teachers to teach to the test, which doesn't help the students grow and creates an environment that values a score over other important learning opportunities. Standardized tested also reportedly causes more students to drop out of high school, and the minimum threshold for proficiency raises each year, which unfairly labels schools as incompetent. The MCAS also caters to those students and schools who are more socioeconomically well off, which makes the playing field uneven for students who live in economically depressed districts. If we continue to enforce the use of standardized testing, we must first make comprehensive changes to the test itself and the system in which it operates.

Funding Structure

6. Do you support or oppose changes to the Chapter 70 Education formula, including the Foundation Budget, to incorporate proper state funding for ELL students, Special Education students, transportation costs, charter school reimbursements to sending schools, and class size reduction?

I support changes that will help level the playing field of districts throughout Massachusetts. Lynn and Boston do not even come close to the benefits that Wellesley and Winchester consistently have. On average, the majority of ELL students within the state go to schools in districts that are either underfunded or districts that do not allocate more money to the needs of those students. Class sizes must also be reduced in schools that, on average, score lower than their counterparts. Extra: extracurricular programs can't be forgotten with all the funding that must go towards children and schools that especially need extra help. Extracurriculars are an important part of the curricula and should be treated as such.

Charter School Cap

7. Do you support or oppose the 2016 ballot question that would lift the cap on charter schools?

I am against Question 2 because I think increasing the number of charter schools would divert much-needed funding from struggling public schools.

Charter Accountability

8. Do you support or oppose legislation measures to bring greater accountability and transparency to charter schools, such as by requiring the backfilling of students throughout the school year and by requiring charter schools to adhere to the same disciplinary procedures and public disclosure standards as public schools?

I support legislation that would require charter schools to show greater accountability and transparency in their policies. Charter schools should be required to demonstrate that they serve students as well as public



schools. Charter schools should be held to the same standards as public schools, especially when it comes to transparency and disciplinary procedures.

Higher Ed Access

9. Do you support or oppose legislation to grant in-state tuition and financial aid to undocumented students?

Yes. Those undocumented students, like those who are citizens, deserve the right to pay in-state tuition costs. Undocumented potential students and their families come to the US and more specifically the state of Massachusetts to better themselves and our collective community. Why would we hinder their efforts to do so? By giving undocumented students the financial aid they deserve, we create a more educated and better society.

Universal Higher Education


10. Do you support or oppose the goal of providing free, publicly funded higher education for every student who wants it?

Yes. Universal higher education helps to solve other critical global issues. D. Health Care

Massachusetts has led the way in providing near universal health insurance coverage, with 96% of the state having health insurance. But there is still work to do. Significant disparities in health insurance coverage and health care access continue to exist along income, racial, and education lines. Premiums continue to rise, and medical debt remains a persistent problem. We still spend an oversized portion of public and private money on health care, but without necessarily achieving better health outcomes.

 - I emphatically support women's right to choose, and would support all legislation that eases access to safe abortion care.




E. Housing

Over the last ten years, the need for affordable housing has increased, while funds for affordable housing have decreased at both federal and state levels. Currently, there is a waiting list of up to ten years for a rental voucher, and the fair market rent for a two-bedroom apartment requires a wage 40% higher than the average renter wage. Half of families in Greater Boston alone pay over 30% of their income in housing and utilities costs—and over 25% of households pay *more than half* their income to housing. This is unsustainable. It has led to expanding economic inequality, increased homelessness, and damage to our economy, as talented workers often leave the state for less expensive regions.

Statement/Experience

1. Please share your personal values and principles regarding affordable housing. How would you ensure that there is suitable housing for all who need it, within reasonable distance of job opportunities? How would you address the need to link housing, jobs, and transportation? How would you tackle homelessness?

Saugus has been one of the most responsive communities in Massachusetts in terms of meeting community housing needs. The town has recently designated the Essex Landing development on Route 1 as affordable housing aimed at young commuters and retirees. If elected, I plan to continue these types of programs that improve the quality of life and job opportunities for all residents.

Funding Housing Programs

- 3. (a) Do you support or oppose increasing state funding to housing programs, and
 - (b) how would you work to see increases (if relevant) realized?

 As a State Representative, I will make sure that this region receives the state funding necessary to meet the demands of its residents. By continuing to seek out and develop underutilized land in our



community, we can tackle homelessness, provide affordable housing, and increase the amount of money coming into the district.

Affordable Housing

4. Do you support or oppose efforts to weaken affordable housing goals under chapter 40b, such as by lowering the affordable housing percent in a community to below 10% or counting market-rate housing as "affordable"?

Affordable housing is key to allowing all of our residents to enjoy the quality of life that they are entitled to. Weakening these goals put this at risk and threatens the prosperity of our community. We will continue to try to meet the goals that have been set out for us by the State if I am elected.

Zoning Reform


Transit oriented and walkable communities are an important catalyst to economic development. I am strongly in favor of any reforms at a state or local level that facilitate affordable housing and growth of local business.



F. Racial and Social Justice

Massachusetts must continue to strive to be a state that welcomes and embraces all of its residents and combats prejudice and discrimination of all kinds. The social and economic costs of mass incarceration and the policies that created it, in particular, have put our aspirations of "justice for all" into crisis. We support a judicial system that does not disproportionately target communities of color and the poor, that does not criminalize public health issues such as addiction, that reorients away from ineffective and costly 'tough on crime' policies. A comprehensive approach to reform must be taken in all aspects of the criminal justice system.

Statement/Experience

1. Please share your personal values and principles regarding Racial and Social Justice.

I believe in creating an equal playing field, and that means identifying and eliminating the injustices that plague our system and keep members of our community from reaching their full potential. This means addressing the systematic injustices embedded in our justice and education systems, rectifying the harm that unjust policies have done to community members, and ensuring that we give every person the



opportunity to live a fruitful life, regardless of their ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, or immigration status.

2. Please indicate work you personally have done to combat racism, Islamophobia, xenophobia, transphobia, and other attempts to marginalize disadvantaged classes.

Mandatory Minimum Sentencing

3. Do you support or oppose legislation to eliminate mandatory minimum sentences related to drug offenses?

People must be held accountable for their crimes, however, mandatory minimum sentencing reform must occur within the criminal justice system. Mandatory sentencing crowds prisons with people who require treatment, not harsh punishment. Reforming mandatory minimum sentences would also reduce the costs of maintaining prisons. This money can be distributed to different agencies and programs to help reduce crime. There are several other issues with minimum sentencing that need to be addressed, like punishments for petty crimes. Some forms of punishment aren't even related to the crime a given felon commits. For example, for some petty drug crimes, a person can be subject to the suspension of their license for five years, even if the crime has nothing to do with a motor vehicle. We must make changes to this system.

Safe Driving Act

4. Do you support or oppose the Safe Driving Act, which would remove immigration status as a barrier to applying for a license or learner's permit?

Yes, I would support the Safe Driving Act. Immigration status should not be a barrier to attaining a driver's license, which many people need to ensure their jobs and economic stability. Additionally, immigration status does not limit how much people can contribute to our community, and everyone living in Massachusetts should have the opportunity to live up to their potential without undue barriers.

Bail Reform

5. Do you support or oppose legislation to reform the pretrial process (bail reform)?

The purpose of the bailing system is to ensure that those charged with a crime show up for their court dates and do not commit other felonies. While the pretrial process accomplishes this (more or less), there are several other problems that the system creates. The bailing system is costly because it detains individuals who could remain in the community without jeopardizing safety. The bailing system is unsafe because it releases the accused who can afford bail, even if the accused are considered harmful to the community. And finally, like minimum sentencing, the bailing system contributes to the overcrowding problem in prisons. We need to transition from a wealth-based bail system to a risk-based system. We must create more structure within this system to keep our community safe while also cutting unnecessary expenditures.

Marijuana Legalization

6. Do you support or oppose the 2016 ballot initiative to legalize recreational marijuana and regulate it like alcohol?

I oppose the ballot measure in its current form. The opioid crisis demonstrates that we need a greater system of control and extra safeguards to ensure that drugs don't fall into the hands of our children and other vulnerable groups.

School-to-Prison Pipeline

7. Do you support or oppose legislation to defuel the school school-to-prison pipeline, such as by stopping zero tolerance disciplinary policies?

The school-to-prison pipeline is one of the greatest systematic injustices in our society. Our schools need holistic disciplinary and rehabilitation policies that won't condemn kids to incarceration for youthful mistakes.




G. Good Government and Good Citizenship

The influence of big money in politics is detrimental to democracy. Independent expenditures in MA elections have grown by a factor of five over the past decade. A centralized power structure on Beacon Hill, is undemocratic, and makes it easier for lobbyists to target the top and undermine the system. Key to any vision of good government is citizen engagement. Voter turnout in midterm elections, and especially local elections, remains low. The Election Modernization Act of 2014 helped eliminate Massachusetts's embarrassing status as one of the ten worst states in terms of voting rights, but there is still much work to be done.

 - In my time working with Seth Moulton, much of my daily role involved assisting constituents in cutting through the red tape of government bureaucracy. I understand the need for transparent and accessible government agencies and officials in order to build the kind of trusting relationship we need to have between people and government.

Power and the Legislature

- 3. If elected, would you support or oppose efforts to dilute the amount of power held by leadership in your respective branch of government? For example, would you support a rule change allowing committees to appoint their own chair, instead of leadership?
 - I support good leadership period. I do not believe power should be taken or given to anyone, rather that it be earned by good actions that have shown to benefit our legislature. If it seems like someone in a leadership position is abusing their power, I will do everything I can to ensure the proper steps are taken to remove that person and replace them with someone just. If directly addressed with committee's being allowed to choose their own chair, I would support that. It's common sense that the members which make up a committee should have liberty to choose their own leader.



Public Campaign Financing

4. **Public campaign financing.** Do you support or oppose legislation to create a robust public financing system for state elections?

I am a strong believer that there is too much private money in politics. We need to reform our system so campaigns can sustain themselves on public funding and give voters the ability to control donations so that private funds do not get in the way of democracy. I support legislation that would improve our public financing system for elections.

Election Day Voter Registration

Automatic Voter Registration




H. Sustainable Infrastructure and Environmental Protection

Massachusetts will be hit particularly hard by climate change. In order to avoid catastrophic climate change, global carbon emissions need to be reduced by 70% by 2050 and brought to 0 by 2080. Massachusetts has been a leader in increasing energy efficiency and reducing carbon production and must continue this leadership role in the United States. This will require the decarbonization of our state economy and a transition away from fossil fuels toward clean, renewable sources of energy. In light of congressional gridlock at the federal level, state government must take a role in incentivizing reduced carbon usage and assisting in coordination between agencies and moving forward local government understanding of looming climate threats.


Public transit must play a role in decarbonizing our transportation system, as well as advancing complementary goals of equity and inclusion. However, Massachusetts politicians have lost their understanding of public transit as a public good that benefits all residents and businesses in Massachusetts, not just those who use it in their daily lives. The greatest evidence of this is their neglect of the MBTA: its debt has grown to nearly \$5.5 billion, with over \$7 billion in deferred maintenance costs. Regional Transit Authorities that serve communities, including Gateway Cities across the state, face enormous capital needs as well.

Statement/Experience

1. Please share your personal values and principles regarding Sustainable Infrastructure and Environmental Protection.

As a lifelong environmentalist, I care deeply about issues concerning the future of the environment. We all benefit from efforts

2. Please indicate work you personally have done to protect the environment and expand access to public transportation.

In my home town of Saugus we have a trash incinerator and a landfill; an issue known as Wheelabrator, that has had horrible effects on the surrounding environment and the health of people that live near it. I have personally met people who are dying due to carcinogens in the air. On top of that the landfill is the only one in the state that does not have a liner and they are attempting to expand into the marshlands which would be devastating for our community's water source. I have tirelessly worked with local activists and organizations to remove Wheelabrator from Saugus and provide alternative options for waste removal and waste reduction.

Global Warming Solutions Act

3. Earlier this year, the Massachusetts SJC ruled that the state has not met the emissions reductions requirements of the 2008 Global Warming Solutions Act. What steps would you support to meet and go beyond the targets set by this act?

It is imperative that we all come together and commit to fighting global climate change. It is very disappointing that the state has not met emissions requirements, and I see the need for a renewed commitment to fighting to pass down a clean, healthy Earth to future generations.

Funding Climate Change Adaptation

4. Will you support or oppose increasing funding and collaboration between state and local governments on resiliency and climate adaptation efforts to help mitigate the consequences of climate change?

Strongly support. We have not done enough to embrace the realities of climate change and we've barely begun to combat them.

Solar Energy

5. Do you support or oppose efforts to increase equitable access to solar power by pushing to remove caps on solar generation and restore compensation for low-income and community solar?

I am a strong advocate for solar and alternative energy. There is a nonprofit organization called GRID out west that works with local and state government to provide free installation of solar panels for low income homeowners. I would love to see something like that replicated in Massachusetts.

Carbon Fees

6. Do you support or oppose legislation to put a fee on carbon emissions? Support. We have seen this done in other states and it has been very effective.

Gas Pipelines

7. Do you support or oppose the expansion of gas pipelines in the state?

The expansion of gas pipelines throughout the state detracts from our goals of creating a greener state.
